



Community Visioning Meeting and AlexEngage Summary March 2016

In the fall of 2015, City Council approved the general outline for a proposed spring 2016 process to draft an updated City Strategic Plan. The current Alexandria City Strategic Plan was intended to be in effect until 2015. The new Plan will use community input as the foundation to define the results of community values; communicate a clear direction to the public and City; include measures and targets to more easily track progress, share success, and identify and solve problems; set a six-year plan from FY 2017-2022 with a mid-point check-in/refinement in FY 2019; and align with the City’s performance management system, Results Alexandria. The draft City Strategic Plan will be considered for adoption by City Council in the fall of 2016.

This report summarizes feedback received during the first community meeting as well as from the March online engagement opportunity.

Community Engagement Schedule



On March 14th, community members took part in small and large group activities focusing on issues and concerns about Alexandria over the last 5 years and how they would like the city to look in the next 5 years.

1. Small Group Activity: Alexandria today and over the last 5 years

Each table had a large easel-size sheet with questions about what community members value and issues that concern them about Alexandria today and over the past 5 years. The facilitator walked the group through each question and recorded responses.






3. AlexEngage - Online engagement opportunity February 26 - March 20, 2016

Community members were given the opportunity to provide feedback on what matters most to them about Alexandria and how they would like the city to be in 2022 through the City's online engagement forum, AlexEngage.

The total number of visitors to the AlexEngage topic page were 395; of those visitors, 236 provided responses.
